Immovable property, as defined under TP Act, excludes standing timber, growing crops or grass. It just excludes only three properties and does not mention what are immovable properties. In order to get comprehensive definition we find a working definition of immovable property in the General Clauses Act 1897, which includes land, benefits arising from land, and objects permanently attached to the earth, excluding standing timber, growing crops and grass. The concept of immovable property is crucial in property law, as its transfer involves specific legal formalities such as registration under the Registration Act, 1908. The Act outlines various modes of transferring immovable property, including sale, mortgage, lease, exchange, and gift, each subject to specific legal requirements.
